Overview

CIEE International Faculty Development Seminars (IFDS) provide faculty and administrators with access to rich academics, diverse intercultural experiences, and innovative approaches to learning and problemsolving that enhance syllabi, internationalize curricula, and increase global understanding on campus. Each summer, the CLA and the Office for Academic Affairs provide funding for two Lynn faculty to participate on the IFDS of their choice. Funding for round-trip airfare is also provided. Applications for the seminars are competitive.

Eligibility

Faculty grant applicants must meet the following eligibility requirements:

- Full-time faculty
- Chosen seminar must be relevant to the faculty's academic discipline
- Applicants cannot have received faculty development funding for the previous two summers

How to apply

Faculty grant applicants must complete the following by the application deadline:
